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ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

The feast of the Assumption celebrates two Marian features: the departure of Mary from this life and the assumption of her body into heaven. At the end of her life on earth Mary was assumed, body and soul, into the glory of the angels and saints. She was taken up into heaven by God.



This feast has been celebrated in the Church since the early centuries but it was only last century that the Church sought to define it formally 'ex cathedra' (as a dogma). In 1950, Pope Pius XII declared that Mary 'after the completion of her earthly life...was assumed body and soul into the glory of Heaven'. Her body was not allowed to become corrupt or to remain in a tomb.

In the early Christian centuries relics of saints and martyrs were jealously guarded and highly prized. Many cities claim the mortal remains of saints, both famous and little known. But, despite the temptation, there are no records of Mary's bodily remains being venerated anywhere on this earth. This too points to the ancient foundation of belief in her Assumption.

'In the plan of your wisdom she who bore Christ in her womb was raised body and soul to be with him in heaven. May we follow her example in reflecting your holiness and join in her hymn of endless life and praise.'

A CAUTIOUS REOPENING OF CHURCH

In order to reopen our church it's important that the many guidelines laid down by the Bishops and the Government are kept to ensure the safety of everyone who comes to church:

- 1. The vulnerable should carefully consider the wisdom of returning to Mass too soon. They are not obliged to do so.
- 2. The Sunday obligation to attend Mass has not been re-instated.
- 3. Those who are able might be encouraged to come to Mass on a weekday rather than a Saturday evening or Sunday, to release the pressure on weekend Masses.
- 4. Each church is limited to how many people they can safely hold at any one gathering. Only one church in a parish may be used.
- 5. All people MUST wear a face mask. Hands must be sanitised as people arrive and leave church.
- 6. Social distancing guidelines are still in force.
- 7. Parish stewards must show people to the church benches, filling from the front and working backwards.
- 8. Church doors and windows should be left open.
- 9. Single use newsletters or other papers may be used but must be taken home.
- 10. Collections should be in a basket on the way in and the way out.
- 11. People MUST leave church immediately after they have received Holy Communion
- 12. Lingering clusters of conversation in the porch or outside the church must be avoided and outside the church gates.
- 13. Toilet facilities are not in use. Piety Shops are to remain closed.
- 14. The church is to be cleaned and sanitised after each Mass or Service.

FOREIGNERS?

When we first start to read the pages of the bible we get the impression that God is dealing simply with the Hebrew nation. The early accounts tell us about the history of the Jews and how they were God's promised people, living in a land given them when they were led from slavery. Not many other nations get much of a good press.



But the middle section of the Book of Isaiah, written much later by a distant pupil of the original prophet, (and sometimes called Deutero or Second Isaiah) starts to show a realisation that God has other plans. In the book of Isaiah we hear very plainly that foreigners will be able to offer acceptable sacrifices to the Lord. This was revolutionary and revolting to some Jewish ears.

The idea that God does not limit his promises to just certain categories of people is known as Universalism and we see it in the Gospels on many occasions when Jesus speaks to people who many see as 'foreigners' or 'outsiders'. It's not where they come from that matters, nationality is irrelevant. Jesus praises many of these people for the quality of their faith.

Nowhere in scripture can we find any evidence of God turning his back on someone just because they didn't fit the bill. There is no support for a God who leaves people wanting when they call on him in good faith. In fact God exudes inclusiveness. God is a gatherer rather than a scatterer, an integrator rather than an excluder.

Usually on Sundays, when we're not in the middle of a pandemic, we profess our faith during the Creed in a Church that is 'one, holy, catholic and apostolic'. We may be a migrant community; we may be a settled suburban group worshipping in a parish that has been established for years and years; we may be multi-racial; we may be all one colour or a rainbow of faces.

But what unites us is that we are baptised members of a 'catholic' Church. And catholic means nothing more than universal. The opposite of catholic is not Protestant. The opposite of catholic is exclusive. So if we're ever tempted to feel that our congregations are becoming too varied, or to hive ourselves off into some sort of sub-group then we have lost a grip on our catholicity.
