
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LOVING AND LOSING - ST AUGUSTINE (August 28th)

Despite having a real saint for a mother (St Monica) Augustine was far from a perfect son. Born in the mid fourth century in Tagaste, present-day Algeria, Augustine embarked on a life of wine women and song, fathering at least one child that we know of. In Milan he came under the influence of St Ambrose who was the city's bishop and as a result of listening to him he eventually was baptised. Subsequently he was ordained and became Bishop of Hippo, in his native Algeria. His struggle with his lifestyle and his gratitude when finally he turned over his life to Christ are summed up beautifully in one of his prayers:

Late have I loved you, O Beauty ever ancient, ever new, late have I loved you!

You were within me, but I was outside, and it was there that I searched for you. In my unloveliness I plunged into the lovely things which you created. You were with me, but I was not with you. Created things kept me from you; yet if they had not been in you they would have not been at all. You called, you shouted, and you broke through my deafness. You flashed, you shone, and you dispelled my blindness. You breathed your fragrance on me; I drew in breath and now I pant for you. I have tasted you, now I hunger and thirst for more. You touched me, and I burned for your peace.

A CAUTIOUS REOPENING OF CHURCH

In order to reopen our church it's important that the many guidelines laid down by the Bishops and the Government are kept to ensure the safety of everyone who comes to church:

- 1. The vulnerable should carefully consider the wisdom of returning to Mass too soon. They are not obliged to do so.
- 2. The Sunday obligation to attend Mass has not been re-instated.
- 3. Those who are able might be encouraged to come to Mass on a weekday rather than a Saturday evening or Sunday, to release the pressure on weekend Masses.
- 4. Each church is limited to how many people they can safely hold at any one gathering. Only one church in a parish may be used.
- 5. All people MUST wear a face mask. Hands must be sanitised as people arrive and leave church.
- 6. Social distancing guidelines are still in force.
- 7. Parish stewards must show people to the church benches, filling from the front and working backwards.
- 8. Church doors and windows should be left open.
- 9. Single use newsletters or other papers may be used but must be taken home.
- 10. Collections should be in a basket on the way in and the way out.
- 11. People MUST leave church immediately after they have received Holy Communion
- 12. Lingering clusters of conversation in the porch or outside the church must be avoided and outside the church gates.
- 13. Toilet facilities are not in use. Piety Shops are to remain closed.
- 14. The church is to be cleaned and sanitised after each Mass or Service.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

How do I answer the question Jesus asks his disciples: 'Who do you say I am?

WHY ARE YOU HERE?

Some of the people who followed Jesus were only there for what they could get out of it. They were happy to think that he might overthrow the Romans because this would give them a chance of an easier life. They were happy to be fed along with the other 5,000 but when he started talking about being food and drink himself they ditched him. How could anyone accept such intolerable language, they said. He was

demanding too much. There are people even today who treat religion as an effective form of networking, as a club or a society which it's good to be seen at.

Others seemed to want to be involved but only on their own terms. They asked what they ought to do if they were to be pleasing to God. But in fact all they really wanted was a list of rules to follow. It's easier to have a set of laws than to have a relationship with God, because then all you have to do is keep the laws. You don't have to go the extra mile or show that your love is real. You just have to keep your nose clean. Our century is not short of people for whom obeying the commandments is more important than really knowing God or sharing in Christ's suffering.

There are always people who are just there for the fun of it. They asked him for a sign, for a miracle, for some form of entertainment. Moses gave our ancestors manna; what trick are you going to do for us? And when yesterday's miracle was over and done with they moved off in search of something else to interest them. Sometimes today too we see fickle Christians who are never happy unless they're on a religious high. So they wander from church to church in search of the latest



theories, better music, a more original style of preaching, a nicer building or a more charismatic leader. Their lack of staying power betrays a lack of commitment to Jesus.

It's possible to call yourself a Christian but not to have a relationship with Christ. It's possible to come to church but for the wrong reasons.

If you are to work for God, said Jesus, then you must believe in the one he has sent. After this, many of his disciples left him and stopped going with him. So why are you here?
