

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GREGORY THE GREAT (September 3rd)

Religion was something of a family business for Gregory. His great-great-grandfather was Pope Felix III, his father worked for the Church in Rome, three of his aunts were nuns and his mother was a saint! (St Silvia).



He became Pope Gregory I in 590 and was renowned as a holy man who was an impressive reformer and administrator as well as having a missionary vision that was responsible for the growth of the Church in many lands and a keen interest in liturgical practice. Many of his sermons and writings survive



to this day. After his death in 604 he became known as Gregory 'the Great', the only other receiving such a title being Pope Leo the Great. Perhaps he is most famous in Britain for sending Augustine to England to 'convert' the tribes who lived there at the time. Augustine, of course, became Archbishop of Canterbury.

A CAUTIOUS REOPENING OF CHURCH

In order to reopen our church it's important that the many guidelines laid down by the Bishops and the Government are kept to ensure the safety of everyone who comes to church:

- 1. The vulnerable should carefully consider the wisdom of returning to Mass too soon. They are not obliged to do so.
- 2. The Sunday obligation to attend Mass has not been re-instated.
- 3. Those who are able might be encouraged to come to Mass on a weekday rather than a Saturday evening or Sunday, to release the pressure on weekend Masses.
- 4. Each church is limited to how many people they can safely hold at any one gathering. Only one church in a parish may be used.
- 5. All people MUST wear a face mask. Hands must be sanitised as people arrive and leave church.
- 6. Social distancing guidelines are still in force.
- 7. Parish stewards must show people to the church benches, filling from the front and working backwards.
- 8. Church doors and windows should be left open.
- 9. Single use newsletters or other papers may be used but must be taken home.
- 10. Collections should be in a basket on the way in and the way out.
- 11. People MUST leave church immediately after they have received Holy Communion
- 12. Lingering clusters of conversation in the porch or outside the church must be avoided and outside the church gates.
- 13. Toilet facilities are not in use. Piety Shops are to remain closed.
- 14. The church is to be cleaned and sanitised after each Mass or Service.

BETTER THAN LIFE ITSELF?

Psalm 62, one of my favourites psalms, used in our liturgy today, is a prayer of a person who desperately longs to know God and to feel God's presence in their lives. In fact, without God they feel like dry, weary, waterless soil. And although they don't always feel God close to them they sit and gaze at the sanctuary to sense God's strength and glory.

We have so many distractions in our lives. Many of them are necessary: we have to work in order to be able to live; our lives with each other inevitably throw up problems and difficulties; and in all the process of getting and having we can end up missing the real point of why we're here on earth.

But it doesn't matter how much we are considered successful by others, in our heart of hearts we know that we will always feel empty if we have not found a place for God in our lives.

Jeremiah says as much in our first reading. God is so important to him that he experiences a fire in his belly that he must tell people about even though he suffers ridicule. And Jesus goes even further in the gospel today. What's the point of possessing the whole world, money, riches, status, power, if it means that you never enjoy the real purpose of life? He reminds us that the only way to enjoy life to the full is to renounce self, to put aside selfish interest, in order to follow him. In other words, if we let anything get between us and God then we become cut off from what can really satisfy our needs.

One of the lines of psalm 62 is quite extraordinary. It simply says, 'Your love is better than life'. Better than life? The psalmist is saying that if our life is not centred on what is really important then it's not worth having. If we have found



God then we realise that our lives are very short indeed yet the only thing that ultimately matters is that we possess God for eternity.

The temptation is to live only half a life, to conform to what our world tells us living is really about. Yet with all its superficial glitter and gloss we know that this sort of shimmering

existence can never meet our real needs and aspirations. And those who have found God's love have no need of this tinsel. For, as the psalmist says, 'Your love is better than life.' Makes you think, doesn't it?
