"A clever woman is never without wool," goes an old Arab proverb, meaning that the wise person always has enough to provide for their family. The author of Proverbs would agree, for his 'perfect wife' has enough wool and flax to work with hands that then reach out to the poor and needy. She has used her talent at spinning wool into thread to clothe not just her family but others in need

After all the servants report back to the master in this Sunday's Gospel reading, the master makes the offhand comment that had he put the money in a bank he would at least have earned some interest. Why then did the master not go the safe route and put all nine talents in the bank to begin with? Perhaps the master was more concerned about teaching his servants how to use their gifts productively than just earning a healthy return. May we show ourselves to be worthy of God's trust in us specifically and in the human race in general, using our talents to do more than just earn interest.

Are we ready for the thief who comes in the night? The woman in the Book of Proverbs is, for she fears the Lord. That is, she has reverence and respect for God because of God's power, sense of justice, and generous mercy. For that reason, she uses her God-given talents for the betterment of others.



We, the Church, are the bride of Christ. Are we the worthy wife Christ is looking for, an unfailing prize, one who brings him good with the goods we have been given?

World Day of the Poor

Pope Francis instituted the World Day of the Poor in 2016. 'as yet another tangible sign of this Extraordinary Holy Year, the entire Church might celebrate, on the 33rd Sunday of Ordinary Time, the World Day of the Poor. This would be the worthiest way to prepare for the celebration of the Solemnity of our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, who identified with the little ones and the poor and who will judge us on our works of mercy (cf. Mt 25:31-46). It would be a day to help communities and each of the baptized to reflect on how poverty is at the very heart of the Gospel and that, as long as Lazarus lies at the door of our homes (cf. Lk 16:19-21), there can be no justice or social peace. Misericordia et Misera, Letter of Pope Francis to end the Year of Mercy, 20 November 2016, § 21.

This year, 2020, the Pope's theme is: 'Stretch our your hand to the poor,' (Sirach 7:32). In Section 3 of his letter, he restates the continuing obligation of the whole church towards the poor:

'Generosity that supports the weak, consoles the afflicted, relieves suffering and restores dignity to those stripped of it, is a condition for a fully human life. The decision to care for the poor, for their many different needs, cannot be conditioned by the time available or by private interests, or by impersonal pastoral or social projects. The power of God's grace cannot be restrained by the selfish tendency to put ourselves always first.

And in Section 6 he extends the thought about 'stretching our your hands' to connect concern for the poor with the coronavirus pandemic: 'A hand held out is a sign; a sign that immediately speaks of closeness, solidarity and love. In these months, when the whole world was prey to a virus that brought pain and death, despair and bewilderment, how many outstretched hands have we seen! The outstretched hands of physicians who cared about each patient and tried to find the right cure. The outstretched hands of nurses who worked overtime, for hours on end, to look after the sick. The outstretched hands of administrators who procured the means to save as many lives as possible. The outstretched hands of pharmacists who at personal risk responded to people's pressing needs. The outstretched hands of volunteers who helped people living on the streets and those with a home yet nothing to eat. The outstretched hands of men and women who worked to provide essential services and security. We could continue to speak of so many other outstretched hands, all of which make up a great litany of good works. Those hands defied contagion and fear in order to offer support and consolation.'
