QUESTION OF THE WEEK

In what way is Jesus king in my life? How do I live in this world while following God's law of love?

CHRIST THE KING

Most solemnities are focused on biblical events. In contrast, Christ the King is focused on an idea.

In the history of the Church it was established rather recently. In the face of powerful and growing secular states in 1925, Pope Pius XI decided to designate the last Sunday in October as a day to recognise the universal rule of Jesus Christ. In 1969 the day was moved to a place of honour at the end of the liturgical year.

The original motivation for the feast, therefore, was to celebrate the dominion of Christ that transcends national boundaries and that makes war a sacrilege against Christ's body. Today as at its inception, war and violence disturb many areas of the world. Pray for these nations, pray for victims of acts of terror and of war.

DOMESTIC ABUSE

Since the global COVID-19 pandemic took hold in the UK in March 2020, there has been a 49% increase in calls and online requests for help relating to domestic abuse. SUNDAY THOUGHTS



It ought to be a comfort to us to know exactly what is on the final exam. We can undoubtedly recall times when we spent hours studying a whole term's work, not knowing what would be on the test. But thanks to today's Gospel, we know how we can inherit eternal life. Those who are welcomed into the kingdom fed the hungry,

welcomed the stranger, clothed the naked, cared for the ill, and visited the imprisoned. Will we take advantage of knowing the questions in advance?

Few of us are virtuous enough to care for the least among us all the time, in every circumstance. Hopefully none of us totally ignore the needy. We likely fall somewhere in between, helping when we feel we can, but ignoring the needy at other times and in some circumstances. Often we choose to spend that money on ourselves or spend that extra time on something we enjoy. We can pray for the grace to make us more generous, at the same time hoping God's mercy is even more generous.

Jesus spent his entire public ministry helping those in need: healing the sick, driving out demons, feeding thousands, washing his disciples' feet, finally giving his life for our sins. But Jesus also asked the woman at the well to draw water for him, reclined at table and allowed Martha to serve him, and accepted the anointing with expensive perfumed oil by the woman in Bethany. Christ is in us all, giver and recipient, and it is in acts of mercy between two people that he can be seen.

Farewell to Matthew. Today we end our Sunday-by-Sunday hearing of St.

Matthew's Gospel. Matthew has kept our eyes on the Kingdom throughout the year, and our reading culminates in the overwhelming picture painted in today's passage, one of the greatest of the many parables of Jesus he records. Matthew has also given us one of the greatest guides to living, the Beatitudes, which tell us that the meek, the poor in spirit, the peacemakers, the mourners - all the unfortunate and all those who struggle for right - will inherit the kingdom.

St. ANDREW (November 30th)

Everyone knows that St Andrew was a

fisherman and the brother of St Peter. Most Scots are aware of the story relating to St Rule who came ashore on the east coast where the city of St Andrews stands today, bringing with him some relics that were said to be of the original saint. What not many people know is that in 1969, when Pope Paul VI appointed Gordon Gray as the first Post-Reformation cardinal in Scotland, he handed him a box containing more relics thought to be those of St Andrew. As he did so he said, "Peter gives you his brother." These relics are now kept in St Mary's Cathedral in Edinburgh.

CHRISTMAS 2020

The way in which we will celebrate Christmas this year will be very different and the Archbishop has asked all parishes to follow the same set of guidelines.

Masses on Christmas Eve & Christmas Day will be ticket-only and this is to ensure that we keep to the maximum number of people allowed in church during the pandemic. Two types of ticket will be available: a single ticket which admits one person or a family ticket which admits upto four people living in the same household.

Tickets will be available from the sacristy or Parish Office from Saturday 5th December. Regular Mass-goers will have the first opportunity to obtain tickets before they are widely distributed. Entrance to the Masses on these two days will be ticket only.

Times of Christmas Masses are:

Christmas Eve:	5.00 p.m.	The Vigil of Christmas
	9.00 p.m.	The First Mass of Christmas
Christmas Day:	10.30 a.m.	

Fr Mark will arrange another Christmas morning Mass if all tickets are distributed and there is need for more Masses. All Masses at English Martyrs.

This arrangement for ticket only Masses applies to all parishes within the Archdiocese.

The Archbishop has also decided that there will be NO Saturday evening Masses on 26th December within the Archdiocese to allow the priests and parish stewards some rest time. There will be midday Mass on 26th December.

The obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and holydays is still not reinstated. The week between Christmas Day - New Years Day is the Christmas octave which means that you can come to Mass anytime that week to celebrate the birth of the Lord and to visit the Christmas Crib.

Sadly because of national restrictions, Masses over the Christmas period will be different as we are still not allowed to sing and the Archbishop has reminded the priests that Masses must still be short. We will have the parish Christmas Crib but this must also be different this year.

NEWS FROM JOSPICE

St. Joseph's Hospice is planning its usual Christmas events this year and hopes that you can join in from your homes.

Both the Christmas ladies Day and Light up a Life service will take place between now and December 4th.

On 29th November, when Christmas Ladies Day would have taken place, the hospice will stage activities on its Facebook page including a raffle, the prize draw and an online Christmas market.

The annual Light up a Life appeal will take place on 4th December with a service when the hospice's Christmas tree lights will be switched on. You can contact the hospice and dedicate a light to a loved one who has died.
