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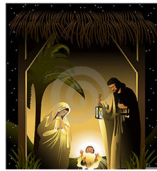

SUNDAY THOUGHTS

Life seems to become more and more privatised as the days go by. For whatever reason, we don't see many children playing games together in our streets or our parks. Buses and trains are full of people who don't talk to each other because they sit listening to music on their own personal stereos. Teenagers are said to spend many hours a week by themselves in their bedrooms on the computer. And families claim that life is so frenetic that they have to make a special effort to eat a brand of gravy together once a week.

Of course, there are some people whose religion is exactly the same. It's about them and God, about them getting holy and going to heaven. If others can do the same, all well and good; but they don't actually affect them in any way.

The feast of the Baptism of the Lord turns all of this on its head. For it reminds us that at our own baptism we were anointed by the priest. We were anointed with oil so that we could become 'priests, prophets, and kings (or queens).' To be a priest means that we offer every moment of our lives to God that they may become sanctified and profitable. To be a prophet means that by our words and actions we are to speak out to our world as spokesmen and women. We are to say what God wants the world to hear. To be a king or queen means to accept responsibility for our world as well as for the kingdom of God. The world we have been given is on loan to us; we are to watch over it, to protect it and hand it on to the next generation in even better condition.

Our religion is the expression of our baptism. We are baptised into a living, believing community that worships collectively, that publicly makes its stand for the power of God's word in our world and is ready to come to the aid of those whose human dignity is under threat. That's because our baptism calls us to be other Christs in our world. Far from being a private hobby it is a reminder that our vocation is to be part of the ever-advancing People of God. And if we're to be part of a people, then we need others.

LOCKDOWN RESTRICTIONS

As we've entered our 3rd national lockdown we are asked to remind ourselves of restrictions affecting places of worship:

You can leave home to attend or visit a place of worship for communal worship but you must follow the guidance on the safe use of places of worship. If you are vulnerable or feel unwell, covid related or not, you must not come to church.

Face masks must be worn properly - over mouth & nose. Anyone who cannot wear a face mask should not come to church.

You must not mingle with anyone outside of your household when attending a place of worship.

You must minimise the amount of time spent in church. When you arrive in church, you must give your contact details for track & trace proposes, get your hands sanitised and you must move straight into church, sitting where the Parish Steward asks you to sit. You cannot stand around the church porch to talk to people.

Candles can be lit but only before Mass and not after Holy Communion.

Please wait in your bench until you are asked to come forward by a Parish Steward to receive Holy Communion. Holy Communion to be given on the hand. Please hold out your hands with flat palms. You must leave church, via the side aisles, immediately after receiving Holy Communion.

You cannot wait in the porch or the church grounds for anyone but must do so outside the church gates. You cannot stand around the church porch or grounds to talk to people.

Mass and all liturgical services will be shorter with certain parts omitted at this time.

If you pick up Parish Newsletters or Mass Sheets, you must take them home and not leave them anywhere in church.

Any priest who needs to shield or isolate should do so and this means that Mass cannot take place publicly and may have to be cancelled without any notice.

It is very important to encourage all who attend our churches to abide by these covid-19 security restrictions and to protect themselves and those around them.

EPIPHANY BLESSING

It is a powerful blessing that lasts the whole year.



Each year around the feast of the Epiphany many parishes throughout the world participate in an annual blessing of chalk. It is an ancient tradition that not only places God at the entrance of your home, it places your entire family under his protection.

The Epiphany blessing of chalk and homes is a centuries old tradition where priests would visit each home in their parish after the Feast of the Epiphany. Over time it became more difficult to accomplish such a feat as parishes became larger and larger and priests were stretched thin. For this reason it became an accepted tradition that a member of the household is able to lead this blessing in place of the priest.

The blessing has biblical roots, deeply tied to the Passover in the book of Exodus.

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt ... "take some of the blood [of the lamb], and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat them. They shall eat the flesh that night, roasted; with unleavened bread and bitter herbs they shall eat it ... The blood shall be a sign for you, upon the houses where you are; and when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall fall upon you to destroy you, when I smite the land of Egypt." (cf. Exodus 12:1-13)

It is no coincidence that the Epiphany blessing is traditionally written on the lintel of the main doorway and even some of the prayers echo God's words of protection that he gave to Moses.

There is no need to bless chalk these days and you are welcome to take the Epiphany Blessing and place it near the front door of your home for the whole year. Take some for your families and friends.

What does the Epiphany Blessing mean?

20 ✠ C ✠ M ✠ B ✠ 21
Christus Mansionem Benedicat
(May Christ bless this house)

The current Year - **2021**

The **four crosses** symbolise Jesus in everything we do this year. The initials **C M B** represent the Latin - 'Christus Mansionem Benedicat' translated as - 'May Christ bless this house'.

But the letters **C M B** also represent the initials of the names of the Wise Men: **C**aspar, **M**elchior & **B**althasar - hence why it's an Epiphany Blessing.

FEAST OF THE WEEK

St Aelred (January 12th)

St Aelred, the son of a Hexham priest, was born in Northumbria in 1110 and ended his days as a monk of Rievaulx, north Yorkshire, in 1167. He is probably best known for the book he wrote entitled 'Spiritual Friendship'. In some ways controversial, Aelred fought against the idea that a monk should not enjoy friendship with particular individuals, although this was the thought of the time. It seems so obvious to us in our century but in his day Aelred had to argue that God created men and women for friendship and that to live without friendship was to live like a beast and not a caring human being. He pointed to the importance of Lazarus, Martha and Mary in Jesus' own life and he pointed out that the spiritual basis of friendship allows a person to come closer to God as well as bringing all the benefits and consolations that intimacy with another entails.
