ADVICE TO PARISHES

Due to the fact that the pandemic is far from over it is not the intention to restore an obligation to the attendance at Sunday Mass at this point. Please remember the importance of keeping Sunday holy and if possible attending Mass weekly.

- 1. Face coverings must still be worn for all those coming to church. (Exemptions for genuine medical reasons excluded)
- 2. Social distancing will not be mandatory in our churches but please be mindful of other people who may want to keep a distance.
- 3. You must sanitise your hands before you enter a church. There will be no need to sanitise your hands as you leave.
- 4. The numbers for weddings, funerals and baptisms are limited to a safe capacity of each church building.
- 5. Holy Communion is now restored to its traditional place. People should approach Holy Communion row by row and not in a haphazard way.
- 6. Holy Communion is to be given on the hand. Holy Communion under both kinds will not be re-introduced at this time.
- 7. Mass will end in the traditional way.
- 8. Singing can gradually be restored and hymn books are allowed but can only be used once a day.
- 9. The collection bags should still not be passed around.
- 10. The sign of peace can be restored but without any touching, ie by a handshake.
- 11. Ministers of the Eucharist can take Holy Communion to the sick & housebound but with the appropriate caution.

Further details may emerge in the coming weeks and we will keep you informed.

UNLOCKING THE MYSTERIES OF THE BIBLE

FACE MASKS

We remind you of the current rule, issued by the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England & Wales and endorsed by the Archdiocese, with regards to the wearing of face masks:

"Face coverings will remain mandatory for all those coming to Mass and/or a church service. (Exemptions for genuine medical reasons excluded.) We must ensure that people wear face coverings properly over both nose & mouth which will reduce aerosol or droplet spread." CBCEW Covid-19 Route Map: Step 4 Guidance. TEST & TRACE

We will not use your details for any other purposes or pass them on to anyone else.

TAKING LITURGY SERIOUSLY

The course is an introductory year leading, hopefully, to courses of greater depth in following years. The target audience is people who have a serious interest in Catholic liturgy but have not had the opportunity to develop their knowledge. There is no written work attached to the course.

"The Church evangelises by the beauty of the liturgy. Let us ask for the personal and sincere meeting with Christ who lives in the liturgy

that our lives may be a spiritual sacrifice offered to God". [Pope Francis – February 2021]

The Society of St Gregory is committed to promoting and supporting the liturgy of the Catholic Church in Great Britain. They offer this modular course as their contribution to the development of liturgical understanding and study in twenty first century Britain. It is offered in partnership with the London Jesuit Centre.

Over the course, there will be the opportunity to explore the Catholic liturgy through a series of distinct yet complementary modules of study. Each module will provide a theological and historical overview which will form the background for a deeper study of how we celebrate the liturgy today. From this, the hope is that students will feel skilled to foster and lead liturgy in their own parish and community.

Within each theme, the focus will be on how we apply general principles of liturgy, how music and space affect the way we celebrate, and above all how we are enabling people to pray together.

Each module will take three one hour sessions, offering time afterwards for questions and comments.

Between sessions leaders would be able to offer some reading/research.

A Certificate of Attendance will be available at the end of each module/the course.

Course fee £30 for an individual module.

ASSISTED DYING BILL

Bishop John Sherrington, Lead Bishop for Life Issues for the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales has written an open letter inviting Catholics to pray for the defeat of the Assisted Dying Bill to be debated in the House of Lords in October.

It encourages all Catholics to write to peers at the House of Lords stating the reasons why they oppose this legislation and particularly explain from personal experience the reasons why this change in the law should be opposed. It urges discussion and communication about this important matter.

Take action...

There are three important actions in the next weeks: **praying**, **writing** and **sharing**.

First, I ask you to pray that the Bill will be defeated.

Second, I ask you to <u>write to the Peers</u> from your personal experience and share stories which will argue the reasons for opposing the Bill as well as narrate the importance of precious time during the final stages of life. The testimony of healthcare and legal professionals will also be important. This needs to be done before the Second Reading on 22 October.

Third, I ask you to engage and share stories and reasons against the Bill on social media.

Briefing papers will be available on the bishops' conference website to assist you as this work develops.

SUNDAY THOUGHTS



Dwight L Moody was one of the greatest American evangelists of the latter nineteenth century. Born in Massachusetts he eventually became a Calvinist preacher of great renown before his death in 1899.

When he was famous he organised a conference on evangelisation and invited the great and the good of his day to come along and discuss the art of preaching and

how to spread the gospel.

Dozens of these specialists gathered in a large church-owned building and after the tiring heavy day they retired to bed. Moody decided to do the rounds of the building to check that all was well before going to his own room. As he went around the corridors he noticed that the course participants had all left their shoes outside their rooms to be polished overnight. These preachers were obviously used to only the best hotels!

Because there was no such thing as a night porter in this conference centre Moody went off and found some brushes and shoe polish. He spent several hours polishing the shoes of all the others. At one stage he was discovered by a friend who asked him what on earth he was up to. Moody explained but asked him not to tell anyone about it.

The friend was so amazed at this that he couldn't keep the secret. He told a couple of his colleagues and gradually everyone got to know about it.

A few days later some of the other eminent theologians felt so moved by what Moody had done that they offered to give him a hand and by the end of the week there was a small team that went round all the rooms at night shining up the boots and shoes.

During the daytime the experts spent so much time reflecting on what it means to be a disciple of Christ but this great man showed in a very practical way that the ones who are really great in God's eyes are those who make themselves servants of all. He knew what Jesus meant when he said, 'If anyone wants to be first, he must make himself last of all and servant of all.'

Try it. It might catch on.

Season of Creation

World Day for Migrants and Refugees

Next Sunday is the annual World Day of Migrants and Refugees – a day the Church has kept since 1914. It is appropriate that this day falls during the Season of Creation because, in addition to war and persecution, the climate emergency is a direct cause of migration.

Towards an ever wider "we" is the theme chosen by Pope Francis for this year's World Day of Migrants and Refugees. It's an appeal to build a universal "we" rather than a national "we". Instead of repeating mantra's we've heard, such as "our country is full", or "they come over here and take our jobs", Pope Francis invites us to look at the reality of why people leave their homes and countries, often risking their lives. He asks us to enter into the experience of these vulnerable people who are running from situations we can barely imagine, and to pray for them as they face so many challenges, including hostility, rejection and closed doors. Pope Francis also asks us to become aware of the opportunities migration offers of countries and communities.

The Vatican has an extensive website directed personally by Pope Francis which aims to help the Church, and others, to accompany those forced to flee and make sure they are not shut out or left behind: https://migrants-refugees.va

There is also a download on the CAFOD website for a rosary to celebrate the Season of Creation. We invite you to use this rosary in to celebrate the Season of Creation, an ecumenical season dedicated to prayer for the protection of creation and the promotion of sustainable lifestyles. It runs from 1 September to 4 October (the feast of St Francis of Assisi).

Pope Francis calls us all to celebrate this moment to "reaffirm [our] personal vocation to be stewards of creation, to thank God for the wonderful handiwork that he has entrusted to our care, and to implore his help for the protection of creation, as well as his pardon for the sins committed against the world in which we live."
