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QUESTION OF THE WEEK

How can I, in communion with the saints, bring the Lord's merciful care to the poor, the poor in spirit, and those suffering injustice?

ADVICE TO PARISHES

Due to the fact that the pandemic is far from over it is not the intention to restore an obligation to the attendance at Sunday Mass at this point. Please remember the importance of keeping Sunday holy and if possible attending Mass weekly.

- 1. Face coverings must still be worn for all those coming to church. (Exemptions for genuine medical reasons excluded)
- 2. Social distancing will not be mandatory in our churches but please be mindful of other people who may want to keep a distance.
- 3. You must sanitise your hands before you enter a church. There will be no need to sanitise your hands as you leave.
- 4. The numbers for weddings, funerals and baptisms are limited to a safe capacity of each church building.
- 5. Holy Communion is now restored to its traditional place. People should approach Holy Communion row by row and not in a haphazard way.
- 6. Holy Communion is to be given on the hand. Holy Communion under both kinds will not be re-introduced at this time.
- 7. Mass will end in the traditional way.
- 8. Singing can gradually be restored and hymn books are allowed but can only be used once a day.
- 9. The collection bags should still not be passed around.
- 10. The sign of peace can be restored but without any touching, ie by a handshake.
- 11. Ministers of the Eucharist can take Holy Communion to the sick & housebound but with the appropriate caution.

REMEMBRANCE MASS FOR PRIESTS

On Friday 12 November at 7pm at the Cathedral, Archbishop Malcolm will be celebrating a Mass for all those priests who have died, from Covid or other causes, since the beginning of the pandemic including Bishop Vincent Malone who died in May 2020. This will be a chance for us to come together as an archdiocese to pray for those priests whose funerals we could not attend because of Covid restrictions. This is a Diocesan occasion so all are welcome.

MASS FOR THE PANDEMIC

On Sunday 7 November at 11am at the Cathedral Archbishop Malcolm will be celebrating Mass for all those who have died in the pandemic, and in thanks for the medical staff, care workers and family members who have accompanied and assisted them in the last moments of their lives. This date has been suggested by the Bishops' Conference, and similar Masses will be taking place in cathedrals across England and Wales. All are welcome.

ADVENT & CHRISTMAS BOOK

A new book called 'Christmas Voices from the Holy Land' has been published and Fr Mark has ordered some copies. The book contains poems and reflections written especially for the Holy Land by Fr Richard



Nesbitt with contributions from Christians living in the Holy Land.

Proceeds of the book will go to 'Friends of the Holy Land'. The book is £9.99 and you can order your copy from the Piety Stall or Parish Office and they will arrive in time for the start of Advent.

FACE MASKS

We remind you of the current rule, issued by the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England & Wales and endorsed by the Archdiocese, with regards to the wearing of face masks:

"Face coverings will remain mandatory for all those coming to Mass and/or a church service. (Exemptions for genuine medical reasons excluded.) We must ensure that people wear face coverings properly over both nose & mouth which will reduce aerosol or droplet spread." We ask everyone coming to church to follow this rule. Thank you.

TEST & TRACE

In order to support the NHS Test and Trace programme, we are taking contact details for all those coming to church. If you have downloaded the NHS Test & Trace App on your smart phone you can scan the QR code instead which is displayed in church.

In line with guidance issued by the Department for Health and Social Care, we will keep your details safely and in compliance with GDPR legislation for 21 days before securely disposing of or deleting them. We will only share your details with NHS Test and Trace, if asked, in the event that it is needed to help stop the spread of coronavirus. We will not use your details for any other purposes or pass them on to anyone else.

PARISH VOLUNTEERS

The Archdiocese has asked Parish Priests to remind people that any work undertaken on church or parish hall premises must have the agreement of the Parish Priest. Work, especially any maintenance, must not be carried out without his consent and knowledge.


Sefton Coach 7 is welcoming applicants for next year's Lourdes pilgrimage from Thursday 21st July - Saturday 30th July.

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GLOBAL DAY FOR CLIMATE JUSTICE

LAUDATE SI' ACTION PLATFORM

On the 25 May 2021, at the close of the Laudato Si' Special Anniversary Year, Pope Francis gifted us the Laudato Si' Action Platform (LSAP), a seven-year journey of ecological conversion in action. The seven-year journey is inspired by the seven Laudato Si' goals: Cry of the Earth, Cry of the Poor, Ecological Economics, Simple Lifestyles, Ecological Education, Ecological Spirituality, and Community Engagement with Participatory Action. The LSAP will create a space for the universal Church to respond to the global emergency we are facing. Through it we can learn and grow together as we take decisive action to build a better future in the spirit of Laudato Si'.

SUNDAY THOUGHTS

November is the final month of the liturgical year. It is also the month in which we remember those who have gone before us, beginning with the special days of All Saints and All Souls. The Holy Spirit connects us with all those who have gone before us, all the saints in heaven, whether or not we have recognised them through canonisation. This is the communion of saints. It may be end of the year, but there is no finality in the lives of those whom we honour and remember, for in the presence of the Lord they join with the living Church for all eternity.

It is early in Jesus' ministry that he sits down and teaches the Beatitudes. This lesson begins the first of the five discourses of Jesus that form the backbone of Matthew's Gospel. Yet the Gospel passages from Mark we have heard recently show that the disciples did not learn these lessons well. Blessed are the meek? The disciples argue about who gets to sit at Jesus' right hand in glory. Blessed are the merciful? They try to prevent parents from bringing their children to Jesus. Blessed are those who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness? Peter rebukes Jesus when he says he will be persecuted. Yet, Peter and the disciples are saints. They may not have taken Jesus' lessons to heart quickly or easily, but over time they did and they now enjoy the kingdom of heaven. There is hope for each and every one of us.

In Jesus' presence the kingdom is built. The verbs used in the Beatitudes are usually in the future tense, but the first and last are in the present tense. The kingdom is not yet here, but in Jesus, its presence is extended into the present. The kingdom of heaven is within the grasp of the poor (Luke's version), the poor in spirit, and the persecuted. God's merciful care of those most in need, which Jesus taught us by word and example, teaches us this.

WORLD DAY OF THE POOR – Sunday 14 November 2021 is the fifth World Day of the Poor, initiated by Pope Francis in 2017 with the theme of "let us love, not with words but with deeds." The theme for this year's World Day of the Poor is "for the poor you have always with you.

ALL SAINTS

eve of All Hallows, the eve of All Saints, but that is the only Christian element in it. All the rest that accompanies Halloween is of pagan origin so it goes back to the time before Christianity. It was a pagan Celtic feast. They believed that after sunset on Samhain, which we now called Halloween, the spirits of the dead and evil spirits roamed the skies seeking to harm humans, especially if the dead had been harmed by them. To protect themselves people people disguised themselves by dressing up in costumes and carried lights inside in turnips. In order to turn a pagan feast into a Christian feast the Church placed the feast of All Saints on 1st November, to coincide with the pagan celebration. Children have fun on Halloween now and it is OK but it would be a pity if children did not know the Christian feast at this time, the feast of All Saints. So if your children are celebrating Halloween and know nothing about All Saints, please explain All Saints to them. We are Christians now, so let us not celebrate as pagans. The Church has tried to turn a pagan celebration into a Christian celebration. Is the reverse happening again now? Let us celebrate All Saints
