ADVICE TO PARISHES

With the continuing threat of the Omicron variation, the Bishops' Conference of England & Wales have issued new guidelines to parishes.

From Friday 10 December HM Government has made the wearing of face masks mandatory in Places of Worship. However, there will be exemptions for those leading worship, public proclamation of scriptural readings or prayers, and those who are genuinely unable to wear face coverings and are exempt.

With respect to the current situation with the Omicron variant it is important to ensure the following points are followed in all churches:

That people displaying any symptoms of Covid-19 should stay at home and not travel to church or participate in person.

That hand sanitiser is available to those attending the Church.

- That there is good ventilation and air throughput in the building; in this case, because of climatic conditions, it would be important to remind people to wrap up well in church.
- There is now very strong evidence to support that the main mode of this variant's viral transmission is through aerosols, and that the risk from surface and touch transmission is very small indeed. Wearing a mask must be done properly i.e. over mouth and nose.
- That people who are engaged in a form of pastoral ministry which involves ministry to the housebound, sick and vulnerable, should take regular lateral flow tests to ensure they are safe to do so. These are free from the NHS.

FEAST OF THE WEEK ST KENTIGERN/MUNGO (January 14th)

Glasgow's coat of arms contains the four symbols of Mungo (or Kentigern), the sixth century saint. They are a bird, a fish, a bell and a tree:



The bird commemorates the pet robin owned by Saint

Servanus, which was accidentally killed by monks who blamed it on Mungo. He took the bird in his hands and prayed over it, restoring it to life.

The fish was one caught by him in the Clyde. When it was slit open, a ring belonging to the Queen of Cadzow was miraculously found inside it. She was suspected of disloyalty by her husband, and thought to have left with his ring. She has asked Mungo for help, and he found and restored the ring

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in this way to clear her name.

The bell may have been given to Mungo by the pope. The original, which was tolled at funerals, no longer exists and was replaced by the justices of Glasgow in 1641. This one is preserved in the People's Palace.

The tree is a symbol of an incident from Mungo's childhood. Left in charge of the holy fire in Saint Servanus's monastery, he fell asleep and the fire went out. However he broke off some frozen branches from a hazel tree and miraculously re-kindled the fire. The feast of St Kentigern is a principal feast of our Archdiocese.

NUGENT CARE

On Saturday 5 February 2022, Nugent will be asking supporters to give up their bed for the night to experience just a fraction of the challenges of what it is like to be homeless. The event's venue is Strawberry Field based in Woolton where today it provides sustainable employment opportunities for young people with learning difficulties. By taking part in Sleep Out with Nugent, you will help to raise money for our New Beginnings project which aims to provide good quality temporary accommodation for individuals who are homeless or at risk of homelessness and have support needs.

The funds raised will provide support packages for those who have been suffering from homelessness when transitioning into their accommodation. It will provide the basic essentials such as pots, pans and towels, items which we often take for granted. EPIPHANY BLESSING 2022

The Church has a custom of blessing homes on the Feast of the Epiphany (January 6) and the days before or after. It is an invitation for Jesus to be a daily guest in our home, our comings and goings, our conversations, our work and play, our joys and sorrows.

There is a card at the back of church with the following inscription: 20 + C + M + B + 22.

The letters C, M, B have two meanings. They are the initials of the traditional names of the three magi: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. They also abbreviate the Latin words Christus mansionem benedicat, "May Christ bless the house." The ""+ signs represent the cross and 2022 is the year.

Marking the doorway to one's home is rooted in the Old Testament. Scripture reminds us that God has commanded his people to mark their doors. The Shema Yisrael:

Hear, O Israel: The Lord is our God, the Lord alone. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might. Keep these words that I am commanding you today in your heart and write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates. (Deuteronomy6:4-6, 9)

As you put the card near your front door say this: The three Wise Men, Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar followed the star of God's Son who became human two thousand and twenty-two years ago. May Christ bless our home and remain with us throughout the new year. Amen.

Then say the following prayer:

Visit, O blessed Lord, this home with the gladness of your presence. Bless all who live or visit here with the gift of your love; and grant that we may show your love to each other and to all whose lives we touch. May we grow in grace and in the knowledge and love of you; guide, comfort, and strengthen us in peace, O Jesus Christ, now and for ever. Amen.

SUNDAY THOUGHTS

Life seems to become more and more privatised as the days go by. For whatever reason, we don't see many children playing games together in our streets or our parks. Buses and trains are full of people who don't talk to each other because they sit glued to their phones and with headphones in their ears. Young people are said to spend many hours a week by themselves in their bedrooms on the computer. And families claim that life is so frenetic that they have to make a special effort to eat a brand of gravy together once a week.

Of course, there are some people whose religion is exactly the same. It's about them and God, about them getting holy and going to heaven. If others can do the same, all well and good; but they don't actually affect them in any way. These are the sort of people who prefer a 'private' wedding or a 'private' funeral. After all, it's about them, not the rest of the parish. Or is it?

The feast of the Baptism of the Lord turns all of this on its head. For it reminds us that at our own baptism we were anointed by the priest or deacon. We were anointed with oil so that we could become 'priests-prophets-kings (or queens).'

To be a priest means that we offer every moment of our lives to God that they may become sanctified and profitable.

To be a prophet means that by our words and actions we are to speak out to our world as spokesmen and women. We are to say what God wants the world to hear.

To be a king or queen means to accept responsibility for our world as well as for the kingdom of God. The world we have been given is on loan to us; we are to watch over it, to protect it and hand it on to the next generation in even better condition.

Our religion is the expression of our baptism. We are baptised into a living, believing community that worships collectively, that publicly makes its stand for the power of God's word in our world and is ready to come to the aid of those whose human dignity is under threat. That's because our baptism calls us to be other Christs in our world. Far from being a private hobby it is a reminder that our vocation is to be part of the ever-advancing People of God. And if we're to be part of a people, then we need others.

Universal Synod on Synodality

Submissions: 10 January 2022 - 10 March 2022

Synod 2021-2023 for a synodal church: communion, participation, mission called by Pope Francis for 2023 was opened on 9 October 2021. Due to the proximity of the launch of our own Archdiocesan <u>Pastoral Plan</u>, the start of our reflection process was delayed in Liverpool until the New Year.

As an archdiocese, we are providing opportunities to participate, albeit in a somewhat "lighter" way than our recent Synod 2020 listening and discussion processes. Resources and submissions are online from Monday 10 January – Thursday 10 March 2022. The submissions received for the universal Synod will be combined with those from Synod 2020 and will form our archdiocesan response.

We have streamlined the submission process as much as possible without losing the breadth of focus that has been provided by the Vatican Synod Office. The preferred method of submitting responses is online <u>www.liverpoolcatholicresources.com/synod2023</u> although email and postal submissions are, of course, possible. The deadline for all responses is **10 March 2022**.
