FEAST OF THE WEEK

St John Payne - 2nd April

John Payne was born in Peterborough into a Church of England family but in his early adult life became a Catholic. He went to the English College at Douai in 1574 and was ordained priest in 1576; the short time he was at the college may suggest that he had studied theology elsewhere. He returned to England



in the company of Cuthbert Mayne. He went to Essex where he stayed at the home of the Petre family in Ingatestone Hall. From here he ministered to local Catholics, while apparently working as an estate steward. In 1577 he was imprisoned for a short time, afterwards returning briefly to Douai. He came back to Essex and continued working as a priest until in 1581 he was once again arrested. He was imprisoned at Greenwich, being charged with conspiracy against the Queen, was racked in the Tower, and was sentenced to be hanged, drawn and quartered. He denied the evidence brought against him completely, stating at his trial "that he always, in mind or word, honoured the queen's majesty above any woman in the world; that he would gladly always have spent his life for her pleasure in any lawful service; that he prayed for her as for his own soul; that he never invented or compassed any treason against her majesty, or any of the nobility of England." He was executed at Chelmsford on 2 April. He was so well known and respected in the neighbourhood that the crowd compelled the hangman to wait until he was dead before cutting him down.

LENT ACTIONS

A few ideas for Lent

- * Pray for those who have hurt you
- * 40 acts of kindness e.g. phone calls to someone who maybe lonely
- * Think about a habit that has kept you from being whom God is calling you to be. Consciously give up that habit for Lent.
- * As a part of your Lenten almsgiving, make a point to learn more about a particular social issue e.g. Ukraine, immigration, human trafficking, racism, the environment, child poverty.
- * Give money to an organisation related to your chosen issue that supports the dignity of the human person.
- * Think of ways that you can be a rainbow in someone else's cloud
- * Think about what you usually spend your money on. Do you buy too many clothes? Spend too much on dinner out? Pick one type of expenditure that you'll "fast" from during Lent, and then give the money you would usually spend to charity.

SUNDAY THOUGHTS

The younger son did one other thing to his father besides demand his inheritance. He abandoned him. He fled to a distant land where he could not be found. He alienated himself. Now remember that Jesus tells this parable after many complained, 'This man welcomes sinners and eats with them' (Luke 15:2). In effect, Jesus is responding to them by asking 'What would you have me do? Turn my back on sinners and isolate them?' The younger son has already isolated himself, turning away from a loving father and a loving God to enjoy as many of life's pleasures as 'his' money would take him. If no one welcomed him back, he would have remained alone: starving for food and for love in a world that had no use for a person without means. Jesus, 'the sinless one' 'made into sin' (2 Corinthians 5:21), welcomed sinners like him and ate with them, sharing food and love with those who had lost both.

Mercy is not easy to accept when we feel it is applied unjustly. Just ask the older son. He had done everything right. Always obedient, always serving his father, he was the dutiful son. He should be the one rewarded; he should be the one honoured. This lavish mercy was decidedly unfair. He resents his father for giving it and his brother for receiving it. Jesus does not tell us what the older son eventually did. But he tells us what the father did. Once again, he took the initiative, going to his son and pleading with him to join him in his joy and celebration. The one son revealed himself to be self-centred by deciding to squander his inheritance on dissolute living. But the other son revealed himself to be shallow, doing the right thing so he would be rewarded. Both needed mercy but only one's need for it was obvious. We pray we can recognise and accept our own need for it.

Jesus, the light of the world, is light in our isolation, illuminating our sin, yes, but also illuminating a way home. For he has returned to the Father from the land of sin and death. He knows the way.

Thank you again for all of your continued support. We are truly thankful for the wealth of goodwill and generosity shown by people across the archdiocese. A big thank you to all of our parish centre managers and volunteers from around the archdiocese who have supported us with this appeal.

We have received an overwhelming amount of donations to our parish centres, with some centres reaching capacity on a daily basis.

This Saturday (26 March) two vans left the Archdiocese of Liverpool to head to the Polish border loaded with aid for the people of Ukraine.

At 9am on Saturday, before the drivers departed, Bishop Thomas Neylon and Father Taras Khomych, chaplain to the Ukrainian community celebrated Mass at the St Margaret Clitherow Centre with the drivers and volunteers.

The goods will be collected by Bishop Gregory Komar, and students for the priesthood from the Holy Spirit Seminary in the Ukrainian diocese of Sambir-Drohobych, who will take the goods for distribution in the Lviv region of western Ukraine. Bishop Gregory is the auxiliary bishop of the diocese and has a close association with the Archdiocese of Liverpool.

We are looking to do further shipments in the near future and will confirm details of this once the drivers have returned.

Once again, thank you for your continued support, we have only been able to run this appeal thanks to the support of our parishes, schools, parish centres and local community.

NUGENT APPEAL

On Sunday 27 March we will be having a second collection to support Nugent, our official

Archdiocesan caring service. This year marks the 200th anniversary of our founder, Fr. James Nugent. Inspired by his work to educate children in Liverpool, support women prisoners in Walton prison and care for the poor, his legacy continues with Nugent today.

Our Marydale secure children's centre in St. Helens is rated by OFSTED as an outstanding service and a recent visit by Will Quince MP, the government Minister for Children and Families, is featured in this month's Catholic Pic. The centre provides a place of safety to some of the most vulnerable children at risk of exploitation and abuse. Inspired by Fr Nugent, all our work is done directly in your name and makes the care and charity of the church really present.

 gloves, burn free kits, eye wash)

 (including halo chest seals, torniquets, splints, QuikClot Combat Gauze, Steri-Strips, triangular bandages, Tourni-Key Plus)
- Toiletries
 (including toothbrushes, toothpaste, soap, shampoo)
- · Bedding, sleeping bags, blankets, mattresses
- Generators and different types of chargers
- Nappy rash creams and baby bath lotions (all ages and sizes)
- Powdered baby milk and feeding bottles
- Pain relief (e.g Paracetamol, Ibuprofen)
- Warm underclothing (including socks)
- Sanitary products
- Nappies

 (all ages and sizes)
- Rucksacks

Please note, as the delivery chain is currently at capacity, we are exploring various options for delivery. In the unlikely event that we are unable to supply these items to Ukraine, all goods will go to a local charity.
