

Commission on Dialogue and Unity Accompanying Ramadan Cardinal Michael Fitzgerald

Ramadan, the ninth month of the year according to the lunar calendar followed by Muslims, started on 2 April. It is a holy month, marked especially by a fast each day during the hours of light. This way of fasting sets Muslims apart from others. In the southern Philippines, on the island of Mindano which has a large Muslim population, the Christians devised a programme which they called Duyog Ramadan, "Accompanying Ramadan". The idea was taken from music. When people sing, they are often accompanied by someone playing the guitar. The guitarist doesn't necessarily sing, but he or she backs up the singers by strumming. In a similar way Christians, who are not observing Ramadan, can accompany the Muslims who are doing so. In 2020, the priests and people of St Vincent de Paul parish, in Liverpool 1, decided to do just this. They wished to accompany their Muslim brothers and sisters, especially by their prayers. In order to sustain this effort some information about Ramadan, or about Islam in general, was provided every day on the parish Facebook account. LENT ACTIONS

A few ideas for Lent

* Pray for those who have hurt you

* 40 acts of kindness – e.g. phone calls to someone who maybe lonely

* Think about a habit that has kept you from being whom God is calling you to be. Consciously give up that habit for Lent.

* As a part of your Lenten almsgiving, make a point to learn more about a particular social issue e.g. Ukraine, immigration, human trafficking, racism, the environment, child poverty.

* Give money to an organisation related to your chosen issue that supports the dignity of the human person.

* Think of ways that you can be a rainbow in someone else's cloud

* Think about what you usually spend your money on. Do you buy too many clothes? Spend too much on dinner out? Pick one type of expenditure that you'll "fast" from during Lent, and then give the money you would usually spend to charity.

BRITISH REGION OF THE INTERNATIONAL ECCUMENICAL FELLOWSHIP

The International Ecumenical Fellowship (IEF) is to hold its 46th International Conference from 25th July to 1st August at Hope University in Liverpool. The theme of this year's Conference is "I will heal my people" (Jer.33:6) - Together in hope, prayer and action for a renewed world'.

Holy Week

CHRISM MASS The Chrism Mass is one of the most important annual celebrations in the life of the Archdiocese. It's the only occasion during the year when priests & people gather with the Archbishop to witness him bless the three oils which are distributed throughout the parishes to be used in the various Sacraments. During the Mass the priests also renew their Priestly Promises which were first made at their ordination. It is always a moving occasion and you are welcome to be part of it on Wednesday 7.30 pm in the Metropolitan Cathedral. This is the first time since 2019 this Mass has taken place.

SUNDAY THOUGHTS

Today the disciples sing and shout as they enter Jerusalem, crying out with joy, 'Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord' (Luke 19:38). But in just a few short days the disciples will be silent and absent as Jesus is led away to Golgotha to be crucified under the inscription, 'This is the King of the Jews' (Luke 23:38). Desolate and defeated, they do not find their voices until the Holy Spirit frees their tongues at Pentecost. But Jesus told the Pharisees that 'if they keep silent, the stones will cry out!' (Luke 19:40). It gives us hope that during times of persecution, times of trial, even in the absence of voices, somehow the testimony of God's creation will bear witness.

Isaiah and Paul get at the paradoxical nature of God's power in the first two readings we hear today. Isaiah has been blessed to deliver God's word to rouse the weary, but all it appears to rouse them to do is to mistreat him. Yet Isaiah trusts he will not be put to shame. He is not the stereotypical scapegoat, hanging his head in shame. The 'suffering servant' witnesses to the power of God's word in the way he stands up to his abusers. Paul testifies that Jesus, though God, became a servant, humbling himself for the sake of humankind. In submitting to God's will to his death, willing and resolute, he has now become the object of worship for all.

Scripture scholars tell us that two verses of today's Gospel were probably not part of the original text. The graphic description of Jesus' suffering in the Garden of Gethsemane may have been added later. Luke may not have been the one to write that 'an angel from heaven appeared to him' when 'he prayed so fervently that his sweat became like drops of blood falling on the ground' (Luke 22:43–44), but the words he did use are extreme as well. First, Jesus knelt when he prayed. Remarkably, this is the only time in the Gospels Jesus kneels to pray. Kneeling was not the normal posture in this era when praying. People knelt in supplication to a superior, as believers occasionally did when asking Jesus for help, not to pray to God. But here Jesus kneels to plead with his Father in an effort to avoid the cross. Agonizing over the suffering he faced, and agonizing over his acceptance of that suffering, his sweat could well have become like drops of blood.

Jesus had taught his disciples that when they pray to the Father they should pray that 'your will be done' (Matthew 6:10). Now that promise is put to the test, as Jesus faces his death on the cross. As he prays to his Father, twice in one sentence he references his Father's will, 'Father, if you are willing, take this cup away from me; still, not my will but yours be done' (Luke 22:42). He would rather not have to die at this time in this way, but he asks his Father to be spared only if his Father is willing. He reaffirms that it is not his own will but his Father's that he will follow. It is not easy to surrender one's own will to someone else's at any time, let alone when facing death, but it is the sacrifice within the sacrifice that Jesus makes on this night. It is the kind of sacrifice that we too can be called to make when we are called to act for the benefit of someone else.

 First aid kits and battlefield first aid kits (including sterile dressings, safety pins, antiseptic fluid/cream/spray, disposable gloves, burn free kits, eye wash) Bandages - different widths (including halo chest seals, torniquets, splints, QuikClot Combat Gauze, Steri-Strips, triangular bandages, Tourni-Key Plus) Toiletries (including toothbrushes, toothpaste, soap, shampoo) • Bedding, sleeping bags, blankets, mattresses Generators and different types of chargers Nappy rash creams and baby bath lotions (all ages and sizes) Powdered baby milk and feeding bottles Pain relief (e.g Paracetamol, Ibuprofen) Warm underclothing (including socks) Sanitary products Nappies (all ages and sizes) Rucksacks Please note, as the delivery chain is currently at capacity, we are exploring various options for delivery.
