FEAST OF THE WEEK

St Jean Baptise Marie Vianney, Cure of Ars (1786-1859)

He was the son of a peasant farmer, and a slow and unpromising candidate for the priesthood: he was eventually ordained on account of his devoutness rather than any achievement or promise.



In 1818 he was sent to be the parish priest of Ars-en-Dombes, an isolated village some distance from Lyon, and remained there for the rest of his life because his parishioners would not let him leave. He was a noted preacher, and a celebrated confessor: such was his fame, and his reputation for insight into his penitents' souls and their futures, that he had to spend up to eighteen hours a day in the confessional, so great was the demand. The tens of thousands of people who came to visit this obscure parish priest turned Ars into a place of pilgrimage.

"The Curé refused to sit for a portrait. When the sculptor Cabuchet surreptitiously tried to capture his features in a ball of wax during the catechism, Vianney sternly bounced him out of the church." (The Curé d'Ars Today, by G.W.Rutler, 1988).

The French State recognised his eminence by awarding him the medal of the Légion d'Honneur in 1848, and he sold it and gave the money to the poor.

THE RELICS OF ST BERNADETTE

In September and October this year, the relics of St Bernadette will journey on pilgrimage to England, Scotland, and Wales for the very first time. This very special once in a lifetime event will provide an opportunity for people of all ages and backgrounds to experience the special gifts and charisms of Lourdes.

The relics will arrive in the Archdiocese of Liverpool on Thursday 15 September and will visit Chorley before moving to the Metropolitan Cathedral on Saturday 17 September - Tuesday 20 September. SUNDAY THOUGHTS

Today's parable about storing large amounts of grain for the future recalls the story of Joseph and the pharaoh in ancient Egypt. Where Joseph is praised for his wisdom to store up grain for the seven lean years to come, today's rich man is criticised for what sounds like the same thing. How come? The



fundamental difference is in the purpose of these people's actions. Joseph, interpreting Pharaoh's dream, advised the entire country to store grain during years of plenty so that people all over the country, and indeed the wider region, from the wealthy to the penniless, would not starve during the years of famine. The greedy rich man, however, only stored his harvest so that he himself could live off of it for years, so he could do nothing but 'take things easy, eat, drink, have a good time'. Joseph saved hundreds of thousands of people with the stored grain across the country. The rich fool only wanted to save himself. And he failed.

We try to control our life in every way. We take care of our bodies to ensure our good health. We take care of our possessions to enjoy our success. We take care of our assets so that we can afford a house, or our children's education, or our retirement. We tend to labour under the illusion that we can control our future. Financial success reinforces that illusion. What we hoard can be lost in a heartbeat. What we give away will go on.

In a consumer-oriented society such as ours, the lesson from today's readings is countercultural. We are challenged to reject the idea that money brings happiness or at least makes it easier to achieve. We are encouraged to build wealth instead in what matters to God. As Paul says, 'look for the things that are in heaven'

Nugent Care, educate, protect and inspire children young people, adults and families who are vulnerable and at risk through our schools, care homes, community and social work services. Nugent is over 140 years old and advocates for people and strives to be the voice for the voiceless.

We are reaching out to you who may be able to support us in donated items for our new service 'The Orchards' – The Orchards is a supported living service in Billinge, Wigan for adults with learning disabilities, physical disabilities or who are suffering with mental health issues.

- First aid kits and battlefield first aid kits (including sterile dressings, safety pins, antiseptic fluid/cream/spray, disposable gloves, burn free kits, eye wash)
- Bandages different widths
 (including halo chest seals, torniquets, splints, QuikClot Combat Gauze, Steri-Strips, triangular bandages, Tourni-Key Plus)
- Toiletries
 (including toothbrushes, toothpaste, soap, shampoo)
- Bedding, sleeping bags, blankets, mattresses
- Generators and different types of chargers
- Nappy rash creams and baby bath lotions (all ages and sizes)
- · Powdered baby milk and feeding bottles
- Pain relief (e.g Paracetamol, Ibuprofen)
- Warm underclothing (including socks)
- Sanitary products
- Nappies (all ages and sizes)
- Rucksacks

Please note, as the delivery chain is currently at capacity, we are exploring various options for delivery. In the unlikely event that we are unable to supply these items to Ukraine, all goods will go to a local charity.
