WELCOMING PRAYER DAY: 26th November 2022

This day is a follow up to the day on Centering Prayer that we held in April, but Centering Prayer Practitioners are welcome, even if they did not attend the first session – if you would like to come, please email Jonathan at spirituality@rcaol.org.uk. Places are limited and will be allocated on a first come-first served basis. If you are not a Centering Prayer Practitioner but still would like to come, please contact us to check availability.

The 'Welcoming Prayer' was originally developed as an active complement to Centering Prayer – to help carry the "letting go" attitude of Centering prayer into the situations we face in daily life. It is used to restore inner equilibrium after experiencing an upset, by consenting to God's presence and action in our physical and emotional reactions to the events and situations we encounter.

The purpose of the Welcoming Prayer is to deepen our relationship with God through consenting in ordinary activities. It helps to heal the wounds of a lifetime by addressing them where they are stored - in the body. It contributes to the process of transformation in Christ initiated in Centering Prayer.

The day will offer a recap on Centering Prayer during the morning and the afternoon will be given to both the theory and the practice of the 'Welcoming Prayer.'

SUNDAY THOUGHTS

The mother and sons in the first reading died for their faith. We are unlikely to face a trial that costs us our lives, but our faith can call us to sacrifice parts of our lives. Remember all the challenges that Jesus gave his disciples. They had to leave all their possessions behind to follow him. They were told they must carry their crosses. They were told that serving Jesus meant serving the least of their brothers and sisters. If we are to be true disciples, doing these things is a way we express our faith. It is easier to do whatever we please, avoiding hardships ourselves and ignoring the hardships of others. But our consciences call us to die to sin, to die to self-centeredness, to die to taking the easy way out, and to live for the promise of the Resurrection.

We ask God to strengthen our faith so that we, like the seven brothers and their mother, like Paul, like Jesus, do not fear death. Our faith tells us that death is not the end. That faith allows us to live courageously in the face of suffering and despair.

The seven brothers in the first reading and the seven brothers in the Gospel have something in common: they all appeared to have died in vain. The Maccabean brothers were killed one after another, never able to get married, to have children, or to grow old. The brothers in the question of the Sadducees died in quick succession, each unable to produce descendants for his elder brothers. Even today we think of our name and our family line living on through our offspring. But we do not truly live on through anything or anyone we produce. We live on because God, Jesus tells us, "is not God of the dead, but of the living, for to him all are alive" (Luke 20:38). We do not live on because we are forever held in the world's memory. We live on because we are forever held in God's infinite memory.

FEAST OF THE WEEK

Blessed George Napier (-1610)

Blessed George Napier was born at Holywell Manor in Oxford and studied at Corpus Christi College. He later went to Douai and was ordained priest in 1596. He



returned to England secretly in 1603 and worked as a priest in Oxfordshire. He was arrested at Kirtlington on 19 July 1610 after he had brought the sacraments to a sick Catholic woman; the possession of the holy oils and a breviary was considered sufficient evidence of priesthood and he was condemned to death at the Oxford assizes. While imprisoned in Oxford Castle, he reconciled a condemned criminal to the Church and prepared him for a Christian death. This was reported to the judges, who angrily brought forward the date of George Napier's execution, lest he should influence other prisoners in the same way. When the martyr was told, he said that he would be glad to do the same for the judges if ever they required it "for he came into the county to execute his functions and to save men's souls." He was hanged, drawn and quartered at Oxford on 8 November 1610. He was beatified by Pope Pius XI in 1929.

We are collecting the following items to donate to Ukraine:

- First aid kits and battlefield first aid kits (including sterile dressings, safety pins, antiseptic fluid/cream/spray, disposable gloves, burn free kits, eye wash)
- Bandages different widths
 (including halo chest seals, torniquets, splints, QuikClot Combat Gauze, Steri-Strips, triangular bandages, Tourni-Key Plus)
- Toiletries
 (including toothbrushes, toothpaste, soap, shampoo)
- Bedding, sleeping bags, blankets, mattresses
- Generators and different types of chargers
- Nappy rash creams and baby bath lotions (all ages and sizes)
- · Powdered baby milk and feeding bottles
- Pain relief (e.g Paracetamol, Ibuprofen)
- Warm underclothing (including socks)
- Sanitary products
- Nappies (all ages and sizes)
- Rucksacks

Please note, as the delivery chain is currently at capacity, we are exploring various options for delivery. In the unlikely event that we are unable to supply these items to Ukraine, all goods will go to a local charity.
