

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

SANCTUARY LAMP

Did you know that this candle is one of the most important candles lit in Roman Catholic Churches? The General Instruction of the Roman Missal states: "In accordance with tradition, near the tabernacle a special lamp should be kept alight to indicate and honour the



presence of Christ in the tabernacle". It is a sign that the Lord is present in the tabernacle and a reminder of Christ's abiding love for us.

This candle is continuously lit except from Holy Thursday evening -Holy Saturday night. Each candle lasts approximately 7 days before it is renewed.

Would you like to dedicate the Sanctuary Lamp to a loved one, living or dead. or for a specific intention? The cost is just ± 5 . If you would like a dedication for a week, place your ± 5 and the intention inside an envelope with SANCTUARY LAMP on the envelope and we will publish the intention each week in the parish newsletter.

The 'Welcoming Prayer' was originally developed as an active complement to Centering Prayer – to help carry the "letting go" attitude of Centering prayer into the situations we face in daily life. It is used to restore inner equilibrium after experiencing an upset, by consenting to God's presence and action in our physical and emotional reactions to the events and situations we encounter.

The purpose of the Welcoming Prayer is to deepen our relationship with God through consenting in ordinary activities. It helps to heal the wounds of a lifetime by addressing them where they are stored - in the body. It contributes to the process of transformation in Christ initiated in Centering Prayer.

The day will offer a recap on Centering Prayer during the morning and the afternoon will be given to both the theory and the practice of the 'Welcoming Prayer.'

SUNDAY THOUGHTS

"The day is coming now," Malachi prophesied (3:19). "The time will come," Jesus warned. Sometimes it feels like the days they anticipated are right around the corner. A pandemic, political and civil unrest, global warming, natural disasters—a warning that the end of the world has arrived doesn't seem so far- fetched. Yet it wouldn't have been a surprise a year ago either . . . or at various other points over the last few years. So when we hear someone say, "The time is near at hand," recall Jesus' words of wisdom: "Refuse to join them!". There will always be those who will exploit fear for their own ends, who will vilify who ever opposes them, who will try to divide us from each other, and who will insist that they alone know the truth. Refuse to join them! No, we know whom we can trust and always follow. And, as the one who is the way and the truth and the life assured us, "Your endurance will win you your lives"

Did Jesus foresee the actual destruction of the temple, which occurred just a few decades later when the Roman army recaptured the city of Jerusalem? Or did he simply realise that nothing built by humans was destined to last forever? Indeed, the kind of time Jesus speaks of here is kairos, not chronos. The signs will come at a decisive moment in time (kairos), not in sequence during a stretch of chronological time (chronos). We should not be thinking of the end as a time that's approaching like the stroke of midnight. It is a time that comes when it comes: inevitably, yes, but unpredictably, like a thief in the night.

So what do we do? Shrivel up in despair, afraid to act? Laugh like those in the second reading, blaming the futility of building anything that will last? No, we are called to act with urgency, persevering in the mission of a disciple, working to bring the reign of God to fruition in our imperfect world.

We pray for children who are suffering, especially those who are homeless, orphans, and victims of war; may they be guaranteed access to education and the opportunity to experience family affection.



FEAST OF THE WEEK

St. Roque Gonzalez (-1628)



Saint Roque González de Santa Cruz was born in Asunción, the capital of Paraguay, on 17 November 1576. He came from a noble Spanish family but also spoke the

local language, Guaraní, from an early age. He was ordained priest at the age of 22 and joined the Jesuits in 1609 to work as a missionary. He was the first European to enter the region that is now the Brazilian state of Rio Grande do Sul. Delicate diplomacy was required to convince the local Indian leaders that he, as a priest, was not there to prepare the way for European settlement of the land.

From 1613 onwards he founded several of the Jesuit 'reductions' which brought Indians together to learn to live in settlements. The 'reductions' later became part of Brazil as a result of a territorial exchange between the Spanish and Portuguese empires. Because of the support the 'reductions' gave the Indians as against the colonial authorities, they were one of the reasons for the suppression of the Jesuits by the Portuguese Empire in the mid-18th century.

In the region of Iyuí (now in Brazil) he had difficulties with the local chieftain and sorcerer who had him killed on 15 November 1628, along with his Spanish companions Juan de Castillo and Alfonso Rodríguez. They were beatified in 1934 and canonized by Pope John Paul II on 16 May 1988.

CHURCH REGISTERS

Our parish registers contain information which reveals a person's religion and personal details, so we can't send copy of entries to people who are simply asking for a friend or relative's information. We can only send copy of entries to the person whose information we have. This is because of date protection law. This means we can't give out information from our registers without checking who is asking. Parish Priests have recently been given further information on this issue.

All parishes must now ask anyone who requests information from our parish registers to provide evidence of their identity so that we can be certain that we are giving the information to the person who received the sacrament.

If you need copy entries such as a baptism certificate for a child under 12 we must ask for evidence of the parent's identity and a copy of the child's birth certificate. A person over 12 must ask for the information themselves or write authorising the release of the information to the person asking. Both people would need to supply proof of identity.

By evidence of identity we mean, driving license, passport, bank statement, credit card statement or a letter from a government agency. Parishes will not keep any proof but will be handed back to the person or the proof will be destroyed.

If you need a certificate for someone who has died we must ask for a copy of their death certificate.

Where 110 years have passed after the date of baptism or confirmation, or 100 years after marriage, the person who received the sacrament is presumed to have died. As data protection law does not apply to the information of those who have died, we can provide information without needing to check identity. If the sacrament was received more recently, then we need to ask for a copy of a death certificate before any information is shared.
