SANCTUARY LAMP

Did you know that this candle is one of the most important candles lit in Roman Catholic Churches? The General Instruction of the Roman Missal states: "In accordance with tradition, near the tabernacle a special lamp should be kept alight to indicate and honour the presence of Christ in the tabernacle". It is a sign that the Lord is present in the tabernacle and a reminder of Christ's abiding love for us. This candle is continuously lit except from Holy Thursday evening - Holy Saturday night. Each candle lasts approximately 7 days before it is renewed. Would you like to dedicate the Sanctuary Lamp to a loved one, living or dead. or for a specific intention? The cost is just £5. If you would like a dedication for a week, place your £5 and the intention inside an envelope with SANCTUARY LAMP on the envelope and we will publish the intention each week in the parish newsletter.



Synodality and our Deanery Synodal Council – a comment for our Parish News Letter

Synodality is both an old and a new way of being Church: walking together as equals, listening to the Holy Spirit and to each other's experience of trying to live Christianly. It is about seeking God's will for the kind of Church God wants us to be now, in our time and place. How can we discern together what we have got right and what is good and therefore should be kept going – and how can we work out what we need to let go of, as being less fruitful or even counter-productive in our context (however valuable it was in the past)?

I have been asked to be our parish representative on the Deanery Synodal council. The council has met 3 times and we are getting to know each other; we are learning about what our parishes are doing and offering; we are trying to see what the gaps are and how we can enhance and support the Christian faith of the people in our area; and we are taking on board the prompting of the diocese and the wider Church about all this.

There are many challenges to face and many graces to receive. Our synodal council is not about any grand plans we might have; it is more about listening carefully to where God is leading us in our local context.

We must not be put off by awareness of our shortcomings, nor by apathy or resistance or reluctance to join in, nor by the fact that people develop and deepen their faith at different speeds. We do need to be honest, transparent, realistic, prayerful, patient, brave and imaginative. With God all things are possible.

Behind all this synodal emphasis, is Pope Francis' belief that ordinary believers are not simply passive recipients of divine truths handed down by superiors, but instead we are given the grace – through our response to God in faith – to be actively involved in discerning what God wants of us and then putting this into practice, as best we can. This is something much bigger than being asked: "do you think X or Y is a good idea?" It is a call to be much more actively involved than we have been used to. It is for us a new way of being Church, but really it is more like it was in the early years of the Church.

I will ensure the minutes of our local deanery synodal council will be available at the back of church and on the parish website for everybody to see and then to comment. Please don't hesitate to speak to me before or after Mass or email me via the Parish email address. I will share plans as they develop and pass on your feedback and contributions

SUNDAY THOUGHTS

Isaiah saw an Israel that no one else could see. Scripture scholars tell us that today's first reading was written when the Jewish people were permitted to return to Jerusalem after years in exile, but found that the city had been utterly destroyed. But Isaiah saw blooming flowers where his compatriots saw a barren desert. He saw God's glory and splendour, not the desecration of the temple. 'Courage!" Do not be afraid,' he urged his neighbours, for God would save them. There are times and will continue to be times when we will look at the world, or the country, or our community, and see much to be pessimistic or downright hopeless about. But with the eyes of a prophet, with the eyes of faith, we can envision 'the splendour of our God' emerging from the doom and gloom.

But it is not easy. Witness John the Baptist. What happened to the unborn child who leaped in the womb in Mary's presence when she herself was with child? What happened to his memory of the Holy Spirit coming down like a dove when he baptised Jesus? What happened to his certainty we saw last week when he announced that the kingdom was at hand? Perhaps the four walls of Herod's prison acted like a barrier to his deeper vision. Or perhaps he questioned why a Messiah who healed the blind and deaf and even raised the dead failed to free the imprisoned. What happened to proclaiming liberty to captives? Had God abandoned him? Have we not wondered the same ourselves?

When James refers to 'the Lord's coming' in the second reading, he is speaking of Jesus' Second Coming, but it can be applied to the Lord's presence at any time. If he is really at hand, how are we not seeing it? How are we not feeling it? Be patient, James tells us. In today's world, where communication, information, and entertainment are immediately available any time, it takes patience and thoughtful consideration to recognise the Lord. In the busyness of these weeks before Christmas, let us take the time to ponder and discern the Lord's presence in our lives.

GAUDATE SUNDAY

"Rejoice in the Lord always; once more I tell you, rejoice! As Christmas draws near, the Church emphasises the joy which should be in our hearts over all that the birth of our Saviour means for us. The great joy of Christians is to see the day drawing nigh when the Lord will come again in His glory to lead them into His kingdom. The often-repeated Veni ("Come") of Advent is an echo not only of the prophets but also of the conclusion of the Book of the Apocalypse: "Come, Lord Jesus," the very last words of the Bible.



Today is known as Gaudate Sunday. The term Gaudate refers to the first word of the Entrance Antiphon, "Rejoice". Rose coloured vestments are worn to emphasise our joy that Christmas is near and we also light the rose candle on our Advent wreath.

CHRISTMAS CRIB 2022

Our Christmas stable and crib is now taking shape and the figures will be arriving very soon. This year the Crib offerings will go to the Bethlehem Care & Hospice Trust.



Bethlehem, is a special place to a great many people in the world. It is special to Christians, to Judaism and to Islam. Many of Bethlehem's inhabitants can trace their ancestry back to the time of Christ. The world has an idealised view of Bethlehem. It is associated with Christmas and the events of 2000 years ago. Many forget that Bethlehem is also a living community facing the everyday challenges of everyday living in an emerging state – Palestine.

Bethlehem's healthcare system is underdeveloped and healthcare delivery is patchy. Cancer related illness is the second highest cause of death. One in eight of all deaths are cancer related. Those with other life limiting illnesses add to the numbers needing care.

Sixty-eight per cent of those first diagnosed with cancer are at a late stage. The average age of those who receive a cancer diagnosis is 55 years.

Family is strong in Bethlehem but without palliative support families are unable to help or comfort, their loved ones who suffer and too often die in pain. At the end of life when the load of symptoms is high families are not able to care for their loved ones as there is no system for home care available for the Palestinian patients. Patients are given little pain control.

Bethlehem Care and Hospice Trust was established within the Catholic Diocese of Hallam, Sheffield, after Bishop John Rawsthorne, the former bishop, led a diocesan pilgrimage to the Holy Land and pilgrims came back touched by what they saw and wanted to help in a specific way.

The charity funds the training of professionals with the help of a hospice in Leeds and the faculty of medicine at Bethlehem University and the first group have now started work by visiting patients in their homes to offer palliative care. Fr Mark has been involved with the charity since its foundation and returns home from a brief visit to Bethlehem this weekend when he has met the team and seen the amazing work they are doing.

Once the crib is in place please give generously to our collection and play your part in this important act of witness to our Christian brothers and sisters in the city of the Lord's birth.

JUBILEE YEAR 2025

As we are quickly approaching the end of this liturgical year, it may be good to cast our glance towards what is coming. Some of you may be aware that the year 2025 will be a year of jubilee, and the motto will be "Pilgrims of Hope". A Jubilee Year takes place in the Catholic Church every 25 years, the last being the Great Jubilee of the year 2000.



In preparation for this jubilee year, Pope Francis wrote a letter in which he calls the Church to renew its awareness of the universal call to responsible participation. Hence, in 2023, we are invited to focus on the four major constitutions of the Second Vatican Ecumenical Council, and all the supporting documents. This new year liturgically started last week with the first Sunday of Advent, and non-liturgically in less than two months. Afterwards, we are to celebrate 2024 as a year of prayer in preparation for the jubilee year. The Pope's vision for 2024 is worth quoting in full, and worth praying with.

"In this time of preparation, I would greatly desire that we devote 2024, the year preceding the Jubilee event, to a great "symphony" of prayer. Prayer, above all else, to renew our desire to be in the presence of the Lord, to listen to him and to adore him. Prayer, moreover, to thank God for the many gifts of his love for us and to praise his work in creation, which summons everyone to respect it and to take concrete and responsible steps to protect it. Prayer as the expression of a single "heart and soul" (cf. Acts 4:32), which then translates into solidarity and the sharing of our daily bread. Prayer that makes it possible for every man and woman in this world to turn to the one God and to reveal to him what lies hidden in the depths of their heart. Prayer as the royal road to holiness, which enables us to be contemplative even in the midst of activity. In a word, may it be an intense year of prayer in which hearts are opened to receive the outpouring of God's grace and to make the "Our Father," the prayer Jesus taught us, the life programme of each of his disciples."

Fr Mark is thinking of another pilgrimage to Rome for the Jubilee Year which will include a visit to the major Basilicas and walking through the Jubilee Door.
