

SUNDAY THOUGHTS

The entire book of Jonah consists of only four chapters, and the chapter we hear today must be the only one Jonah would be proud of. You see, this is the second time the Lord called Jonah on this mission. In the first chapter, Jonah responds immediately to God's call . . . by jumping on the first ship sailing in the opposite direction! During a

brutal storm, the sailors throw him overboard, fearing that he brought on God's wrath. In chapter two, Jonah is swallowed by a great fish, leading him to pray in desperation. Given a second chance in the passage we hear, he obeys at once. But in the final chapter Jonah is miffed. Nineveh was the enemy! Jonah hoped that he might see at least some of God's promised wrath. But God teaches him that repentance, not punishment, was always the goal, for God's mercy trumps God's anger. Jonah may have failed to do right at first, and his heart was still divided when he did right,



but he saved thousands of people from destruction because in the end he followed God's call.

God promises us new life after repentance and conversion. Jonah found it after three days and three nights in the belly of the great fish. The people of Nineveh found it after they turned to fasting and sackcloth. Simon, Andrew, James, and John found it after dropping their nets and following Jesus. Now it is our turn to trust that repenting and following the Lord will be rewarded.

Note that Jesus did not tell the pairs of brothers that they had to study him for a good long time and pass a test before they could go out and fish for more disciples. No, he told them straightaway that all they had to do was follow and he would make them fishers of others. We need not be nervous about first becoming qualified enough to reach out to others. As long as we sincerely follow him, we can invite others to follow as well. The kingdom of God is at hand, within our reach.

REGULAR GIVING TO THE CHURCH

The best way to give regularly to the parish is with a Standing Order so that your contribution is paid by your bank to the parish account. This reduces the cash that has to be handled. Envelopes will always remain available but please consider the use of Standing Orders. Please contact the parish office if you would like one. If you are a tax payer please consider joining the Gift Aid Scheme as this is a way of increasing our income without having to ask people for more money. For every £1 you give 25p extra will be claimed back by the parish.

MOBILE PHONES

Following discussion at the Bishops' Conference, we have been advised that, due to the sacred nature of the confessional, mobile phones must not be brought into the



confessional or they should be switched off before entering. They should not just be put to silent mode. This is because, even if in silent mode, phones can still listen-in to conversations and artificial intelligence algorithms identify items of interest to potential advertisers. This technology does not affect every network but must be presumed to be operative because it cannot be proven otherwise.

This is a good reminder that mobile phones must not be used in church and should be switched to silent mode or switched off completely.

JUBILEE 2025

2025 is a very special year for the Catholic Church as it will be a Jubilee Year and Pope Francis has called upon all Catholics to prepare for this important occasion with a Year of Prayer in 2024. What is a Jubilee?

In the Catholic Church, the concept of Jubilee or 'Holy Year' was used to declare special years for forgiveness and reconciliation. The first Jubilee was declared by Pope Boniface VIII on 22nd February 1300 to mark the beginning of that century. He later recommended it occurring every 100 years. Various other Popes changed the length of the interval between the observances. But Pope Saint Paul II set the present 25-year interval in the 1500s. So Holy Years are "ordinary" when they occur at regular intervals (25 years in these modern times) and "extraordinary" when they are proclaimed for a very special reason.

More recently a Great Jubilee was declared in 2000 by Pope Saint John Paul II to celebrate the new millennium. That Jubilee year brought the total number of universal Jubilee years to 28 that so far had been celebrated by the Church.

The 2025 Jubilee, which has the theme of **"Pilgrims of Hope"** will be a year of hope and trust for a world suffering the impacts of war, the ongoing impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic and the increased threats to the climate.

Intended as a time of conversion and emphasis on God's mercy and forgiveness of sins, Jubilees begin with the opening of the Holy Door in St. Peter's Basilica. Holy Doors at each of the four papal basilicas in Rome are destination points for pilgrims, who pass through seeking special graces.

Jubilee 2025 will be a very special year which will begin on Christmas Eve 2024 and will end when Pope Francis closes the Holy Door on Epiphany 2025. Fr Mark is planning a pilgrimage to Rome for us to walk through the Holy Door in St Peter's and in the other Major Basilicas in Rome. More Jubilee 2025 news over the coming weeks.

FEAST OF THE WEEK— St John Bosco (1815 - 1888)

Born in Piedmont of a peasant family, and he was brought up by his widowed mother. He became a priest, and his particular concern was for the young. He settled in Turin, where, as in so many cities in the 19th century, the industrial revolution was bringing enormous movements of population and consequent social problems, especially for the young men who came there to work. John Bosco devoted himself to the care of the young, first of all by means of evening classes, to which hundreds came, and then by setting up a boarding-house for apprentices, and then



workshops for their training and education. Despite many difficulties, caused both by the anti-clerical civil authorities and by the opposition of some senior people within the Church, his enterprise grew, and by 1868 over 800 boys and young men were under his care.

To ensure the continuation of his work, he founded a congregation, which he named after St Francis de Sales (a saint for whom he had great admiration), and today the Salesians continue his work all over the world including in the Bootle parish of St James and Savio High School. His feast day is next Sunday.
