SUNDAY THOUGHTS

Job's life has become a drudgery: restless nights followed by forgettable days. Every evening he ends his day without hope. He has no confidence that his life will change. A couple of weeks ago we heard Jesus call Andrew and Simon. They abandon their nets of drudgery and follow him to a brand-new life. Today we see Jesus enter Simon's mother-in-law's house, where she lay in bed ill. His healing touch leads to her a new life, a life of ministry to her fellow



disciples. Often we feel as Job did, stuck in a rut and despairing of our misfortune. May we instead find hope in Christ, as his first disciples did, allowing him to guide us to a life of service, a life with purpose, a life for the kingdom.

Interestingly, the Greek word **egeiro**, which Mark uses to describe how Jesus raised Simon's mother-in-law out of bed, is used in a slightly different form by the angel who greets the women at the tomb when they come to anoint Jesus' body. Remember that Mark wrote his Gospel long after Jesus' death and resurrection. It would appear that Mark intentionally used the same word the angel did to describe what Jesus did here. Jesus is truly raising her to a new life, a life of ministry to and for others.

Often we just have to learn things by ourselves. Sometimes it's because we're unsure if we can trust the person who's teaching us. Sometimes it's because what we're told seems unbelievable. But often it's simply because we learn better when we figure it out on our own. In today's Gospel, Mark says that Jesus did not permit the demons he drove out to speak *"because they knew who he was"*. Later, we will hear again and again that despite following him for a long period of time, the disciples still misunderstood who Jesus was. They only learn little by little over time. Perhaps Jesus realised he had to wait patiently for his disciples to gradually learn who he was. What the demons could have revealed would not have enabled true learning.

HOMES FOR UKRAINE

Caritas Social Action Network are working in partnership with St John of God Hospitaller Services to coordinate a Homes for Ukraine programme, which provides temporary housing and support for Ukrainian displaced individuals as they adjust to life in the UK. The organisation has successfully matched 132 Ukrainian guests with generous hosts across the country. Nearly two years since the war in Ukraine started, the number of those wishing to evacuate and find refuge in the UK remains high.

MOBILE PHONES

Following discussion at the Bishops' Conference, we have been advised that, due to the sacred nature of the confessional, mobile phones must not be brought into the



confessional or they should be switched off before entering. They should not just be put to silent mode. This is because, even if in silent mode, phones can still listen-in to conversations and artificial intelligence algorithms identify items of interest to potential advertisers. This technology does not affect every network but must be presumed to be operative because it cannot be proven otherwise.

This is a good reminder that mobile phones must not be used in church and should be switched to silent mode or switched off completely.

LIVERPOOL ARCHDIOCESAN SAFEGUARDING AUDIT

Following a week-long audit on Safeguarding measures and policies, the Archdiocese of Liverpool has received 'Results Being Achieved' mark which is excellent news. The audit was conducted by the Catholic Safeguarding Standards Agency (CSSA) which ensures that Safeguarding of children and vulnerable adults is correctly carried out within the Catholic Church in England & Wales.

The audit praised the Archdiocese on a number of factors including a clear zero-tolerance approach to abuse that is modelled and championed by the Archdiocesan leadership; engagement and care given too abuse survivors; the effective management of allegations and concerns; and the delivery of training and support for clergy.

FEAST OF THE WEEK

St Josephine Bakhita (1869-1947)

Josephine Bakhita was born near Jebel Agilere in South Darfur (Sudan). Kidnapped when still very



young, she experienced the cruelty of slavery as she was sold several times in slave markets of Africa. Finally she was rescued by an Italian family and brought to Italy where she not only became a Christian but also felt the call to consecrate her life to God as a sister. She joined the Canossian Daughters of Charity and lived the rest of her life at Schio, a small village near Vicenza. She died on 8 February, 1947 and her feast is celebrated on Thursday.

JUBILEE 2025

Fr Mark continues the reflection which on Jubilee 2025, beginning on Christmas Eve 2024 and which Pope Francis has asked all Catholics to prepare for with a Year of Prayer and Reflection in 2024. Pope Francis has issued a letter to reflect on the Jubilee and we will reproduce it over the coming weeks:

To My Dear people

The Jubilee has always been an event of great spiritual and social significance in the life of the Church. Ever since 1300, when Boniface VIII instituted the first Holy Year – initially celebrated every hundred years, then, following its biblical precedent, every fifty years, and finally every twenty-five years – God's holy and faithful people has experienced this celebration as a special gift of grace, characterized by the forgiveness of sins and in particular by the indulgence, which is a full expression of the mercy of God. The faithful, frequently at the conclusion of a lengthy pilgrimage, draw from the spiritual treasury of the Church by passing through the Holy Door and venerating the relics of the Apostles Peter and Paul preserved in Roman basilicas. Down the centuries, millions upon millions of pilgrims have journeyed to these sacred places, bearing living witness to the faith professed in every age.

The Great Jubilee of the year 2000 ushered the Church into the third millennium of her history. Saint John Paul II had long awaited and greatly looked forward to that event, in the hope that all Christians, putting behind their historical divisions, could celebrate together the two thousandth anniversary of the birth of Jesus Christ, the Saviour of humanity. Now, as the first twenty-five years of the new century draw to a close, we are called to enter into a season of preparation that can enable the Christian people to experience the Holy Year in all its pastoral richness.

MARRIAGE WEEK 2024

The annual week of prayer for those who are married takes place from 7-14 February. Marriage is God's gift to his people. It is an expression of the depth of human loving, of its enduring reality and of its likeness to the love of God.

A Christian marriage is rooted in faith. Firstly, that means faith in God, as the giver of life and the one who promises eternal life to those who believe in him. Faith also means God's faith in his sons and daughters. For married people, love of neighbour begins with love of each other and of all the children that may be granted to them as parents.

National Marriage Week is an opportunity to ponder on this display of God's love for the world he created. It is a chance for married couples to reflect, perhaps with their families, on how they might develop the good things that exist between and within them. It is a time to demonstrate the value of marriage, based on sincerely lived vows, to men and women and to society as a whole. This is a week of prayer for the whole Church, in gratitude to God who has given us life and taught us to love so that we can be as he made us - a visible icon of himself.
