#### SUNDAY THOUGHTS

When we teach children about the calming of the storm we use a well tried and tested route. We talk about not having to get upset when things go wrong because Jesus is there to take care of it. And there's nothing wrong with this.

But adults are nagged by a further question. Jesus was sleeping. What happens when our world is turned upside down and God seems just to have dozed off, unaware of what we are going through and helpless to come to our aid? And at certain times in our lives God can seem to be a Rip Van Winkle god, one who can't be roused at all.



No sensible person expects God to be at our beck and call calming every minor storm that brews up in our lives. God is not a jack-in-the-box who jumps out when we release the catch.

So in today's gospel story it is worth noticing that Jesus does not rebuke the disciples for being afraid in the boat. He remonstrates with them for their lack of faith. Their fear is only natural but he chides them for not overcoming their fear. Although they greatly admired Jesus, for whom they had left everything, they showed that they didn't really know who he was. Who can this be? Even the wind and the sea obey him.î

The apostles, like us, were men of faith who honoured God but who kept God at a distance because they were afraid to let him into their inner lives where he might see their pettiness. When the storm raged they were afraid, but they were even more fearful when Jesus calmed the storm. Could it be that they were uncomfortable to find that God was right next to them? Could they have preferred God to remain asleep?

How close are we prepared to come to God without being afraid? Our lives are full of sea crossings, of storms, winds and tempests. We are tossed on the waves of so many rough experiences. But the acid test of our faith comes in what we do when we feel that God is taking a nap, when we feel completely alone. The truth is, of course, that God never sleeps. It's just that our faith has trouble rousing him. And this type of faith, being comfortable with God, is the necessary condition for our arriving safely at the other side of the lake.

#### CATHEDRAL RECRUITMENT

Young people are at the forefront of music at the Metropolitan Cathedral. The Cathedral Choir sings at seven choral services each week, leading the congregation in the singing of hymns and psalms, and offering repertoire from the treasury of sacred music to enhance the liturgical celebrations and raise the hearts and minds of those present to God. It is through their ministry of music that many people who enter the cathedral come to know the beauty of God. The Metropolitan Cathedral is the only Roman Catholic cathedral in the UK that offers both boys and girls an equal opportunity to undertake a full choir school chorister experience – at no cost to parents. Children are recruited from Liverpool and surrounding areas, with choristers coming from as far afield as Widnes, Southport and St Helens. Opportunities to sing are offered to young people from age 7 to 18 and beyond.

Being a chorister is a unique opportunity for a boy or girl in our Archdiocese, allowing them to engage with music, to live the Catholic faith in the daily celebration of the liturgy, and bring joy and hope to many. The high musical standards that the choir achieves on a daily basis do not happen without sacrifice: many hours are spent in rehearsal, with liturgies taking place almost every day. But for those who are fortunate enough to have the experience of being a chorister, it is a life- shaping one.

Do you know a child who would like to be a chorister at the Metropolitan Cathedral of Christ the King here in Liverpool? The search is now on for our next generation of boy and girl choristers.

All choristers are educated at Runnymede St Edward's Catholic Primary School and St Edward's College meaning that a first-class Catholic chorister education for boys and girls in Liverpool is available at no cost. ## THE NEW LECTIONARY

The Lectionary, which is the book that contains the Scripture readings for Mass and the Sacraments, is changing as part of the continuing process of revising liturgical translations. The process began with the Roman Missal in 2011 and has continued with all the other liturgical texts.

For over 50 years, the Church in England & Wales has been using the Jerusalem Bible as its definitive translation for liturgical use; the new Lectionary will use both the English Standard Version - Catholic Edition (ECV-CE) and the Abbey Psalter for the psalms.

The changes are intended to make the biblical translations more faithful to the original languages, to reflect current biblical scholarship, and to provide a text for use in a liturgical setting that is more easily proclaimed.

The Lectionary will become mandatory for use in all Catholic parishes and Mass centres in England, Wales and Scotland from Sunday 1st December 2024.

The CTS have been appointed to publish the new Lectionary and they have now released further information and cost.



Currently, the Lectionary is in 3 volumes, but the new Lectionary will be in 4 volumes at a cost of £695 (£173.75 each) and Fr Mark is grateful for the offers of sponsorship. Three of the volumes have been taken with just one more volume left for a chance to be sponsored. The CTS will

provide a special 'Donor Bookplate' in which the donor's name will be placed in the Lectionary and will be there for future years to come. If you would like to do this, please have a word with Fr Mark for more details.

Fr Mark has ordered some leaflets to explain the new Lectionary and why the translation is changing and these will be available in a few weeks time.

## **GENERAL ELECTION 2024**

The Prime Minister has called a general election for Thursday, 4 July.

Gospel values inform how we look at the world as Christians. These values can also offer a different way of looking at politics, a way that puts the common good before self-interest.

Throughout this election season we will be seeking answers which will help the poor, the marginalised, and the vulnerable. We hope that these resources will help in that endeavour.

There are many issues of interest to Catholic voters, but in particular there are seven: Criminal Justice, Domestic poverty, family life and taxation, Education, Environment, International relations, human rights and peacebuilding, Life Issues, Migration.


#### FEAST OF THE WEEK

#### St John Southworth (1592-1654)

John Southworth was the only English martyr to suffer under a dictatorship. The English Civil War ended; the King was executed; the Elizabethan Prayer-Book outlawed; freedom of conscience proclaimed. But Catholics, who had been accused of plotting against the King, were still

persecuted when there was no King; they had been fined for refusing to accept the Prayer-Book, and they were still persecuted when there was no Prayer-Book; all they asked was freedom of conscience for themselves and their countrymen, and freedom of conscience was given to everyone but them. Priests had to come and go, in secret, in fear of betrayal and death, as they had had to do for more than a generation.

John Southworth was ordained priest at the English College at Douai in 1618. After returning to England he was arrested in Lancashire in 1627 and condemned to death, but the sentence was commuted to imprisonment; in 1630 he was handed over, with several other priests, to the French Ambassador for transportation abroad. Whether he actually went or not seems uncertain, but he was certainly in England in 1637, when Westminster was devastated by the plague. He was seen visiting an infected house, and was arrested and charged with being a priest. On that occasion the authorities quietly set him free but such clemency enraged the Puritans and in 1654, when they were in power, they had their revenge. He was arrested again and put on trial. When he was found guilty the judge wept as he passed the sentence of death. His body now rests in Westminster cathedral and is the patron saint of English priests.
